Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

It's November. The district meetings are over. We've said goodbye to Soroptoberfest. We've turned back the clocks and gained an hour. The holiday season begins in three weeks—earlier if we consider the pre-Thanksgiving preparations. Family and friends will come together to share a turkey dinner, pumpkin pie and love. It is a treasured time.

Turning back the clocks brings to mind our October program meeting. Members of our club who attended the District 1 meeting last month gave reports; a few of them can be found on pages 12–15 of this newsletter. We had two first-timers—Gena Royal and Gail Watson. Both joined our club last year, so there was a lot for them to absorb. I think they might still be processing things.

The other part of the program that morning came by way of two members of the Port Angeles Jet-Set club. These women attended the Soroptimist International Convention last July in Turkey. Becky McGindy and President Judi Hoffman arrived with enthusiasm, smiles, books to view, and door prizes. These were items they received from members of other countries during the convention. Each member of our club put her name on a piece of paper that was put into a basket. Later papers were drawn and the names read; the members got to choose a gift.

Becky talked about the dress of the Islam women in Turkey, and made a good point about its value. Many women there like the Muslim attire because when speaking with someone, they know the person is looking at their faces, not at their bodies. Another thing Becky said that stuck with me was, at one meeting there were women from five different countries at her table. There were five different languages, yet they were able to communicate with one another. I found this interesting—but then, we are Soroptimists.

Judi Hoffman emphatically stated she felt the most impressive speaker at the convention in Istanbul was Michael Kaufman. He is an educator, writer, and social animator focused on innovative approaches to engaging men and boys in the promotion of gender equality, ending violence against women, and promoting more positive ideals of manhood. He is the co-founder of the White Ribbon Campaign. Awareness and education are keys to change. White ribbons are worn, much like purple ones for domestic violence awareness and pink ones for breast cancer awareness. I assimilated some of Judi's enthusiasm about the topic and included an article about the White Ribbon Campaign on page 9.

Some people question if there is value in going to area, district, federation and international meetings. The examples above show there is—and not just for the members who are physically there. They become ambassadors, bringing back what they've learned and sharing that with others. As we turn back the clocks in our minds to a meeting we attended, we gain something that is ours, and we can share it—making it a treasured experience for everyone.

I am grateful for all the treasured experiences I've lived—either in person or through the sharing by a friend. We are united in our mission. We are individuals working together as a family of focused women as we reach higher through dignity of service. Thank you all for being part of it!

AWARDS AND SCHOLARSHIPS


The SIS Board has increased the amount to be given for several of our awards and scholarships. Here is the current list:

Scholarships

- High School Seniors, two, at \$2,000 each.
- Continuing Education, for women enrolled in post-freshman year higher education, four at \$2,000 each.

Awards

- **Live Your Dream Award** for women who are financially responsible for their households and are enrolled in post-secondary education, two at \$2,000 each. **Please encourage applications for the November 15th deadline!**
- **Professional/Technical Award** for a woman pursuing post-secondary career education typically leading to a license or certificate, \$2,000.
- **Violet Richardson Award** for young women ages 14-17 engaged in volunteer action within their communities or schools, two awards, each giving \$250 to the young woman and \$250 to her volunteer organization.
- **Ruby Award** for a woman who either through her personal or professional activities works to improve the lives of women and girls, one at \$500 given to the award recipient.

PURPLE UP—A DAY FOR DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS

Although there was only a small group of us that showed up for the Purple Up event on October 17 we had a great time! Those who were there donned purple sweaters, scarves and jackets and walked down the streets, some with our dogs appropriately wearing a purple scarf.

We hardly were rained on as we stood on opposite corners of Washington Street and Sequim Avenue, holding signs with messages against domestic violence. The community demonstrated their support with horn honking, “thumbs up,” and waves.

During the walk, a man stopped us and said that his daughter was currently in an abusive relationship and he had been unable to convince her to leave it. Armed with handouts, he was given a flier that included testimonials from domestic violence victims—male and female; young and older—who had received the love, support and validation needed to break the chain. Included was contact information for Healthy Families.

Are we going to do it again? You bet! Armed with a better understanding of the City’s permit process and obtaining the requisite liability insurance, the ideas for next year’s event are flowing. What could make it better? YOU! We need to have more members in attendance—the more the merrier but more importantly, the stronger the statement we make to Sequim citizens.

If even just one person benefits from our efforts, we call it a success. And, based on the community’s response, we counted the day in the plus column.

WHITE RIBBON CAMPAIGN—HOW IT STARTED

On the afternoon of December 6, 1989, a man walked into the École Polytechnique University in Montreal and massacred 14 of his female classmates. His actions traumatized a nation and brought the issue of violence against women to the forefront of our collective consciousness.

Two years later, a handful of men in Toronto decided they had a responsibility to speak out about and work to stop men’s violence against women. As a result, the White Ribbon Campaign in Canada became an annual awareness-raising event, held between November 25 and December 6.

In 1999, the United Nations General Assembly declared November 25 as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, with a white ribbon as its iconic symbol.


Pitch in and do your part by:

DrREAM IT, BE IT—CAREER SUPPORT FOR GIRLS

Several of us attended the session on Dream It, Be It. We learned that this is a Soroptimist International of Americas program for girls who face obstacles to their future success. The program provides girls with access to professional role models, career education, and the resources to live their dream.

Each Soroptimist club is encouraged to participate in this program and may enter into the program at any time, but it is not required. For a club to be considered a participant, their program must include the seven modules developed by SIA. Several clubs in District 1 are fully engaged in the program, but are going about it in different ways, such as a seven week program or a one day program, all incorporating the seven modules.

- Discovering Your Dreams
- Exploring Careers
- Creating Achievable Goals
- Rising Above Obstacles
- Turning Failure into Success
- Balancing Your Stress
- Putting Dreams into Action



We also learned that everyone in Soroptimist must have a background check to work with children. Working with another agency, such as the schools requiring a background check, is acceptable. If not, one must obtain their own. The presidents of the clubs are to keep a record the background checks.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING

At the District 1 Meeting I attended two sessions about Shared Hope International. Linda Smith, a member of the Washington State House of Representatives and state Senate, traveled to Mumbai, India, to see Falkland Road—one of the worst brothel districts in the world. The hopeless faces of desperate women and children enslaved in prostitution compelled Linda to found Shared Hope International.

The presenters for this program were Nick and Jo who run Shared Hope here in Washington. The mission of Shared Hope is to prevent sex trafficking, restore its victims, and bring justice to women and children affected by this devastating crime. The hope is to save the victims and get help from trained professionals, an alert community, just law and policy, knowledgeable service providers, and appropriate shelter options.



In the Seattle area Shared Hope has a shelter in an undisclosed location to aid women aged 18 to 24 years old who have either escaped from sex trafficking or been taken there by law enforcement. The home offers residents affordable housing options while they pursue education or vocational training.
