Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

October brings a Soroptimist Day of Unity of sorts—or rather a weekend of unity—as clubs come together at their respective district meetings. This gives members the opportunity to leave their local neighborhoods and become aware of what's happening with other Soroptimists in their district. Soroptimists come from many walks of life. Some are more intense, like the vibrant colored leaves—while others are a bit less flamboyant. It is our diversity that makes us beautiful. Like the leaves, each of us adds our own individual tint to create a magnificent mosaic. Each of us has a voice—and we don't need to be stepped on for it to be heard.

Recently a long-time member of our club stopped by my office. She mentioned when the dues letters came out she considered not renewing her membership. She wasn't sure what she had to offer. It was her husband who encouraged her, commenting on the significance of what she receives from being a member. This is a woman from whom I have learned so much. She is a vital part of our club—one who continues to show up, participate and share with us. Her voice is important because it imparts wisdom, insight and the history of we are.





FOUNDERS PENNIES ADD UP

Soroptimist celebrates **Founders Day** on **October 3**, which acknowledges the day in 1921 when the first club in Alameda County, California, called to order its first business meeting. A long-time Soroptimist tradition linked to Founders Day is Founders Pennies.

The tradition of giving pennies began in 1943. Clubs collected one penny for each year of Soroptimist's existence and used that money to help re-establish clubs in Europe that had disbanded as a result of World War II. In 1946 the fund was renamed the Founders Fund. This fund provided international fellowships, scholarships and other awards to improve the status of women. Beginning in the 1960s, Founders Pennies began funding for the Youth Citizenship Awards, and in 1972 for the Women's Opportunity Awards (then called the Training Awards Program).

Founders Pennies are now used to fund the Live Your Dream Awards and other critical SIA programs that improve the lives of women and girls throughout the world including Soroptimist Club Grants. Founders Pennies represent approximately 10% of the funds needed for SIA programs.



Each year, every Soroptimist is offered the opportunity to make a voluntary contribution of six pennies for each year of Soroptimist's existence. Our club collects Founders Pennies with our dues. ~kp

GALA GIFT SHOW

Two months to go for the Gala Gift Show! Vendors continue to ask for applications daily. As we are a juried show, potential vendors are required to send in photos of their product and their booth display. We are picky! That's what keeps our patrons returning, and increasing (up to 900 last year), every year and assures that our reputation for a "unique shopping experience" stays intact. We don't want to be like all of the other shows! Our vendor registration team of Linda Collins Chapman and Laura Rundle is doing a fabulous and very timely job of replying, sorting, deciding and all of the response that happens after selection. Thank you team!

Our sign up list is filling up fast. We still have two crucial spots that need a leader: Chair for the Bake Sale-Obtain all wrapping goods from storage early in the week, an experienced person will go with you to locate. Baked goods (by everyone) are delivered to the wrapping location Friday about 10:00 a.m. Chair leads the wrapping team with many experienced ladies on the crew. Wrapping materials are supplied. Bows will be pre-made. Chair (and crew) counts wrapping goods leftover for next year, packs neatly for storage in a plastic bin. Baked goods are transported to B&G by the transport team. Chair leads at selling table. Many ladies work the table. It's is completely sold out within two hours. Clean and tear down at 4:00 p.m. No early tear downs by anyone-that keeps all of our vendors there. We must play fair! Bake sale people may leave when sold out but please have a crew return to clean up.

Tree Decor in Main Gym—This is the focal point in the gym and it is sort of our trademark. Resting benches sit in the area. Tons of ornaments are available. Gold and black on our white tree. Make it elegant. Take down Sat at 4:00 p.m., pack decorations.
