Throughout the process, it has become increasingly evident that, although we share the same goals and visions, we have many versions of how to get there! Our challenge in assembling SI Sequim's budget is to balance those methods of "getting there" to best serve our club, its members, and those who desperately need our help.

As the club's costs increase and more is required to just exist as a club, the cost of aiding the women and girls we serve also grows. Our spirits lean in different directions as our feet take us down the same path. Some of us are concerned about our outreach covering many, many lives while others would like to see more concentrated efforts toward making a major influence in a smaller number of lives. Some prefer that we stay true to our fundraising goals of using every dollar of our profits to finance our club's programs while others believe that a small portion should be used to supplement the operation of the club, and if so, at what percent becomes another issue. We are torn between trying to keep dues at a reasonable rate and not wanting to give up any of our mission goals. These are not differences in ideals or selflessness, of responsibility or caring. They are simply individual preferences based on personal experience, passions, and hearts that break for so many different injustices. These are the differences that give us such a wonderfully diverse, caring organization.

I want to thank and commend our Finance Committee on their willingness to attempt a balance in our program goals and our club requirements. I have attended their meetings and have observed first hand the efforts to respect and balance the opinions of all our members, often sacrificing their own preferences to truly represent our entire group.

There may soon come a time when we have to decide, as a club, if we want 100% of our fundraising profit to go into our programs or if we want to use some of that money to cover expenses for the club. We may have to weigh the balance of helping to touch many lives or being the strong tide that helps sweep a few individuals to successful and satisfying lives. These are all good worthwhile decisions and, as long as we work together with grace, there are no wrong conclusions. We ALL have the right heart for this job and we will continue to be a force for good if we persist. Don't give up, don't grow weary, don't forget the mission. Please be patient with the process. Ask questions. Make suggestions. Give and take.

(Be sure to let me or any of the Finance Committee members know if you have questions or observations. We have tried to make the budget as simple and understandable as possible. Dear Friends,

It's April—National Welding Month, National Inventor's Month, Keep America Beautiful Month and—on April 22, it is Earth Day. It is also the first full month of spring.

It's April. The month following our Gala Garden Show. This year's event happened just days before spring began. People are now getting down to earth—literally—and planting things, some which they purchased at our recent garden show. Over that weekend I had the opportunity to talk with many vendors. One of them was Jeff Yeager, who does garden art.

He takes old metal objects—that seemingly have no further use—and welds them into unique sculptures. Jeff told me he took welding in high school, and 30 years later discovered a way to use and expand on what he learned. He might use the handles of an old pair of scissors for the eyes of an owl, and the bottom part to make the letter V in the word Love. There is so much love in a garden—garden art can say it too!

The items in his booth were rustic looking; after all it is old metal—though all of it still has character. His business is called Emerald Greens Yardart which I thought was interesting. The name itself is a contrast to the metal—it is the color if you will, in his business. It reminds me of renewal of the earth, repurposing things that would otherwise be discarded and thought to have no additional value. He is keeping America beautiful repurposing on purpose.

Jeff has a vision that most others don't. I could see that and could understand it. It is similar to how I see words in a way others might not. Like the word *untie*—if we rearrange just two of the letters *it* becomes the word *untie*. Similarly we can rearrange our thoughts. We can choose to untie any *knots* of what we see as differences, and unite in knowing our differences are *not* a liability—but rather, our diversity makes us stronger.

Diversity will be on display at the 101st Northwestern Region Conference in Stevenson, WA, later this month. Members from different walks of life and different generations will come together in Soroptimist spirit—sharing and learning together. It's perhaps no coincidence that April is also National Diversity Month.

We have diversity right here in our club. Members have unlimited ways to reflect their diversity by sharing their ideas and talents. Two ways that immediately come to mind are: 1) being on the club's board of directors and 2) working on a committee—perhaps even co-chairing one. 
