Luisa Sheppard

Our club was fortunate to receive many LIVE YOUR DREAM applications for 2019.

Our 2019 LYD choice is **Luisa Sheppard**, a single mother of seven children. They moved to Sequim from Seattle from a domestic violence situation. She was



married to the father of the children for 16 years, many of those years were spent in verbal, emotional and physical abuse as the father's addiction spiraled out of control. Luisa and all of her children were moved out of the county to a safe house where they had to start their lives over. Eventually they stayed at a hotel in Port Angeles in one room for eight months. When Luisa was laid off from the job associated with that sheltering situation, she went to Serenity House in Sequim with her children and they were placed in the family shelter.

Luisa worked with her case manager and she was hired at Reflections Counseling Center in Port Angeles. With the encouragement from management she applied for a Chemical Dependency Professional Trainee license and started working as a CDPT in November of 2016. Moving here changed her whole world and her kids' world. Luisa is the embodiment of those whom we hope to assist through our work as Soroptimists and our Live Your Dream program. She has lived through sexual abuse as a child and through domestic violence as a teenager and through her early to mid-adult years. As she accepted the award we could see that she is a survivor and a fighter and her opportunities to succeed are endless.

KATHLEEN DeJONG – 2-Year Director, 1-yr remaining



Kathleen De Jong would love to have been raised on a farm. Even though she grew up in Kirkland, Washington, she learned about providing nourishment from an early age. Her father was the owner of a chain of grocery stores, culminating in Art's Food Center in the Crown Hill section of Seattle, where Kathleen and her brothers learned the grocery business from top to bottom.

After majoring in history and sociology at Washington State University, Kathleen worked for some years at the Bon Marché in Seattle and later at Geotechnical Engineering on Mercer Island. She returned to school for computer programming and applied her

new skills to Dairgold's Seattle headquarters. There, she first worked in operational support, advancing ultimately to manager of telecommunications, responsible for the company's vast phone system. Although she did not live on a farm, she was helping to put dairy products on American tables.

Fast forward some years to Sequim where Kathleen and Ray bought a farm on Lost Mountain, fifteen acres that welcomed a herd of Hereford beef cattle crossed with Angus. Here there was room for two golden retrievers and Dudley, a large American Paint horse who took to the trails in the Olympics with ease. A few years ago, Kathleen and Ray sold the farm and moved to a beautiful home in Carlsborg—with only the smaller animals.

While Kathleen says that she and Ray do not travel extensively, she has made several trips to Ireland to visit relatives. Those may have led her to a serious interest in genealogy and the chance to share a stash of family photographs among many cousins.

Serving on Soroptimist's board this year is by no means Kathleen's first leadership role in the club. She was club president in 2008-2009.

PUBLIC AWARENESS—SPREADING THE WORD

Here we are and it's March! We are down to the final stretch for the garden show. So much has been done to develop and promote the show. We just completed the *Gazette* tab insert that came out this past week; we listed our show on four chamber sites; we recorded advertisements being broadcast on KSQM and public service announcements on four other stations—not to mention several other news publications, along with our Facebook page and the development of posters. So, I am sure you are wondering why I have mentioned the foregoing. Well, we are all familiar with word-of-mouth advertising. It is the oldest form of advertising to promote a great business, event or celebration. There is a simple concept in advertising, and I want to share its relationship with our membership.
