Do you really think that the past officers would not be there beside you to help, guide, and even teach you what you need to know? Do you have that little faith in our sustainability? Believe me, I know, this may not be the perfect time to take on such a commitment. It will never be the <u>perfect</u> time! But somewhere in our club there are members who are holding back because of inexperience, insecurity, or lack of support, and those things are all attainable, all negotiable, and all easily overcome! I would willingly commit to serve as Parliamentarian if that is the scary part for you and there are others who can come along side to help in other areas. No one is in this alone!

Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends.

It's May—the month that brings us Mother's Day. It is a time we honor not only our moms, but also those who have nurtured, encouraged and supported us. This May, at our business meeting, we will be presenting the slate of nominees for the 2019-2020 officers and board members.

This brings to mind a past Soroptimist member and past club president who passed on last month—Peg Rinker. Peg was our president 1999-2000, and that year she passed on a lot of lessons to me. During her term—my second full year as a member—I was the club's Corresponding Secretary. I noticed she sometimes called people the wrong name. Someone would correct her; she would acknowledge it, laugh and move on—it wasn't a big deal. That impressed me and endeared her to me. She had an unexpected impact on me. My ideas about leadership changed. I had a new perspective. A leader doesn't need to be perfect—especially when 'perfect' is subjective.

So when the 2000-2001 Nominating Committee asked me about being president, instead of declining—I accepted. Instead of feeling my lack of Soroptimist experience would be a detriment to the club, I felt I could trust the members to assist me along the way. And that is, indeed, what happened. I am so grateful for Peg's tutelage. This isn't the only area in which I learned from her—or followed her.

Peg handled Vendor Support for the Gala Garden Show for many years. She got to know a lot of the vendors. Early on, she started wearing a hat at the show that was adorned with flowers. Over the years things were added to it—the last being a small watering can. It was her signature hat. One year, when the vendor registration position abruptly became vacant just weeks before the show, I stepped in. I had a thin headband to which I attached multiple colored flowers. I wore it at the show. It has become my signature headband. Was this influenced by Peg and her hat?

Peg was the one who initiated taking photos of the vendors and, after the show, would send them a thank you card with their photo in it. One year Peg's camera malfunctioned and she asked me if I would be willing to take the vendors' photos. She knew I had my camera with me—no surprise. The mantle had been passed; after that I took the vendor pictures and sent out the thank you cards. Again, I followed Peg's lead.

Even after Peg moved away she made her way back to the Gala Garden Show. The vendors were happy to visit with her. It was heart-warming to see Peg since she had been so much a part of it. At our recent show in March, our only vendor who has been with us since the first show—all 21 years—asked if Peg was going to be there; Peg wasn't able to attend.

Days after the show I heard Peg was extremely ill. I was able to reach her by phone. I told her Edna and Manny had asked about her. She said that was nice; I could hear the smile in her voice. Then she said she heard I was coming back as president of the club. I told her that was true. Then I shared with her how it was her leadership that led me to accept the position the first time, back in 2000. She thanked me. I said I should be thanking her.

I am grateful I had the chance to talk with Peg and tell her what a difference she made in my life and in the life of our club. I share this with you to honor Peg, but also to help you understand a leader doesn't do the job solo. It takes a team to reach new heights. Please consider stepping up to the President-elect role, or to being a co-chair of a committee. Through our service we Rise By Lifting Others.

Thanks, Chris, for bringing your energy and expertise to our operation.



Answering phones led to her becoming an escrow officer in her father's firm and she did so for twelve years. She continued as an escrow officer for another 18 years in Utah. Although Connie is now retired, she still works as a certified signer as a mobile notary. Although, not full-time, it has allowed her to meet some wonderful people and learn the area. Connie's sons live afar and close! One lives in Wisconsin and the other just down the road in Port Hadlock. Port Hadlock is just a skip and jump in today's commute schedules, so Connie and her husband enjoy a weekly overnight visit from their 4-year-old granddaughter.

Connie has only been a member since September, 2017, but took her membership seriously and stepped-up to leadership roles. She immediately responded to the request to become a board member and then became the chair for the garden show raffle.
