Message from the President

It's July. In Sequim, that means Lavender Festival time! Held the third weekend in July, the festival attracts visitors from all over the US and beyond. I found it interesting that there are over 450 lavender varieties. Also, not all lavender plants have that distinctive aroma that we immediately recognize, and some lavender plants aren't purple. Lavender has many properties, making it a benefit in everything from reducing anxiety, to flavoring food, to decorating our homes.

Lavender is a plant that naturally thrives in sunny, dry climates like Sequim's. There are dozens of lavender farms spread across the Sequim-Dungeness Valley, all of which produce more lavender than any other region in the contiguous United States. Sequim is known as the Lavender Capital of North America.

During Lavender Weekend many farms are open for tours. Some of the farms have booths where vendors sell their products. Most farms offer food, beverages and/or entertainment. Our club will have a booth at Lost Mountain Lavender Farm—this will be our second year of partnering with Port Townsend Winery. In addition to wine and lavender lemonade, this year we will also be selling lavender homemade baked goods—see page 10.

WOMEN FOR WOMEN INTERNATIONAL SPONSOREE

Our club sponsors TWO women survivors of war in Afghanistan through Women for Women International. In Afghanistan, there is intense gender discrimination that has been cultivated for generations. Just seeking an education, employment or basic healthcare services can be a life-threatening endeavor for many women. Decades of ongoing violence have left millions of women displaced and widowed, and looking to earn an income to provide for themselves or their family.

Because of safety reasons, we are unable to have photos of either woman or to know many particulars about them. We can know, however, that we are helping two women and two families in this war-torn country. I'm so glad we've continued to budget for this opportunity to have an impact elsewhere in the world.



One of our sponsorees (aka "sisters"), Husna Qadoos, has just finished the first quarter of her year-long training we are sponsoring. This quarter she's getting to know her value as a woman, a mother, an income-earner and as a decision-maker in the household. She learned basic money management and she selected a vocational track—such as tailoring, agriculture, or rug weaving—that she will follow for the rest of the training as she builds new business skills.

The second of our "sisters" is Mahboba Aziaullah, who has just begun her program. In the introduction letter we received, we are told that she is single, never married and has no children. What we do know is that she survived war and has overcome hunger and abuse and our sponsorship will help lead her to a better and happier future.

Currently I am corresponding with both of these women on behalf of all of you, the club, but would gladly share that responsibility with someone else. Please let me know if that's something you'd like to do. You only need to correspond with her a few times in the year of sponsorship and we can collaborate on newsletter articles to keep the club informed as to where they are in their education and training.

MULTIPLYING THE PUBLIC'S AWARENESS


Facebook often comes up as a subject of interest when members talk to me about the Public Awareness Committee. I hear lots of reasons why members don't do Facebook and I certainly understand—but let me share the recent benefits of Facebook.

As an organization, we know that advertising can be most expensive and I, for one, am always looking for inexpensive ways to educate and inform the public about our organization and fundraising activities. Recently, we put a call out for artists for the 2020 Gala Garden Show. Not only did we place our request on the community page of the Sequim Gazette and Peninsula Daily News, we also advertised the call for artists on our two Facebook pages-Soroptimist International of Seguim and the Soroptimist Gala Garden Show. The results were amazing! Our Soroptimist International of Sequim page generated 18 individuals sharing our post and a total of 2563 people viewing the page. Our Soroptimist Gala Garden Show page was shared by five individuals, resulting in 378 people viewing the post. That is a total of 2,930 individuals viewing our request for artists to submit their work. This is a very effective way of using the least amount of money but getting a big return.
