Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

It's September. It is traditionally thought of as back-to-school time—back to the 3 R's—Reading, 'riting and 'rithmatic. When we hear the word school we often think of a physical place—a building where teachers educate the students. The word school can also be used as a verb—an action word. An instructor schools [teaches] those in the class.

I find words very interesting, both written and spoken. I recently watched a YouTube video by Pluto the dog titled **50 words**. Pluto isn't real—well, she is a real dog, but she can't really talk. The words she says are actually her mom speaking. I always get a few lessons from what Pluto says—so much wisdom is imparted.

In this video Pluto talks about the book *Green Eggs and Ham*—a classic Dr. Seuss story. She tells us that the writer made a bet with his boss (Bennett Cerf, the co-founder of Random House) that he could write a book using only 50 words. This was back in 1960 and the bet was for \$50. The boss lost the bet. I was curious how a book could have only 50 words, so I went to check for myself. Well, what I discovered is I misinterpreted what Pluto said. There are more than 50 words in the book, but there are only 50 different words—many words are used multiple times. Ha! [That's something Pluto would say.]

The main character—Sam I Am—asks an unnamed character if he eats green eggs and ham. The reply comes back—no. Sam I Am continues to ask—giving options of where the green eggs and ham could be eaten. Each time the answer is no. Sam I Am doesn't give up—and finally the unnamed character agrees to try them. After he eats the green eggs and ham, he announces that he likes them. He says he will eat green eggs and ham in all the scenarios previously suggested by Sam I Am.

Sam I Am is consistent, persistent, and focused on the goal. This is a great lesson for all of us. The unnamed character shows us not only is it okay to try new things—in trying them, we might discover we like them.

Pluto provides us with some wise thoughts. She says: "You can use small, everyday words and less of them [like in *Green Eggs and Ham*] and let them do the heavy lifting of your thoughts.... Think about your words before banging on the alphabet bar [keyboard].... Fingers move faster than your thinking box [brains].... If you don't want to eat the words, you probably shouldn't even serve them.... Do a little snore and then your fingers will be a little calmer, and your thoughts could have some time to catch up with them." WOAH!

I feel a bit like I'm back in school with the 3 R's. Pluto's video got me **Reading** about *Green Eggs and Ham*. The *Soropti-Scoop* got me 'riting about it. The lessons mentioned above bring in the 'rithmatic because everything adds up to the continuing of learning.

As Soroptimists we are a bit like Sam I Am. We are persistent in our focus on our mission. We take action to empower women and girls through access to education and skills they need. Even if that is not in a physical school building, they are building a future for themselves that allows them to live their dreams. We continue to learn new ways to assist them—Outside the Box.

DREAM IT, BE IT

In our first Dream It, Be It session we thought about someone we admired and considered the qualities we admire in others. In that we find what quality and traits and values are important to us.

In the second session, we delve deeper into values, beliefs, and standards we consider to be important in our lives and those we admire. Our values differ from one person to another, are shaped by a variety of sources, and can guide us in our development and in making life decisions.

When we think back to whom we admire, we ask, Why. Our values are often influenced by many different factors and knowing our own work values is sometimes hard to separate from our personal values and from those of our family and friends. The messages we receive from all around our area of influence are very important. Thinking about how our own values are alike or different and what about them is important are a couple of exercises during the session.



The session ends with the participants discussing work, careers, and how their values affect whether they are committed, satisfied, effective, and fulfilled in their work. Values can clash with your work, or help you put forth your best effort. Values can help to determine the career path someone will take.

MEMBERSHIP: FROM RECRUITING NEW MEMBERS TO KEEPING OUR GOLDEN GEMS ACTIVE

For the next three months, I am privileged to offer a brief article about Soroptimist membership. I hope to present some tips and suggestions to make your membership in our club successful.

What do you, and potential members, want when determining whether to join an organization?

Studies have shown—and recent SIA interest surveys agree—that relationships, mission, personal growth, and volunteer opportunities are the top reasons for becoming a club member.

- **Relationships**—Many indicated they sought being around friendly, like-minded women. As hard as it may seem with online meetings, take time for socializing before and after our meetings—Dial in a few minutes early to chat with those waiting. See if there is time for a committee meeting after the same online meeting to keep the enthusiasm flowing. Invite a prospective member to join an online meeting. If possible, introduce them to other members of the club so they have a certain comfort with this distant sort of gathering.
- **Mission**—SIA's signature Dream Programs, the Soroptimist Live Your Dream Award and Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls are life-changing programs. Prospects want to join Soroptimist because of our mission to improve the lives of women and girls.
- **Personal Growth**—Gaining leadership and personal development opportunities through membership is another reason for joining an organization. There are committees and other positions available. Our Northwestern Region provides meetings and conferences for our members to work, learn and play while planning our programs for women and girls.
- Volunteer Opportunities—More than half of prospective members surveyed were looking for hands-on opportunities to do volunteer work. In the next few months, physical distancing may keep us from gathering to do our typical Soroptimist club activities this time of year. If you have ideas for ways we can safely volunteer, please share with our board for future conversation and brainstorming.
