#### **Message from the President**

This is the month that dues statements are going out for you to renew your membership. It's been another year of COVID and Zoom meetings, and many of us are wondering if we will ever get to spend time in friendship and service together again. We are talking about the possibility of hybrid meetings next year—ones that you could attend in person or watch from home on Zoom. Hybrid meetings will allow us to hold meetings in person, while at the same time letting people prevented from attending by time or illness participate online.

But just because we have still been stuck at home and on Zoom, we haven't stopped. We have accomplished many things during our 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Year:

- We met Merrin Packer and learned about the needs of the McKinney-Vento and houseless students. As a result of her talk, members donated \$1500 to the program. A shopping trip for three of the graduates is planned for clothes that will help them in their next phase of life. Jolene Sanborn and her husband are donating laptops for the girls.
- We had a hugely active Scholarships and Awards year led by Chairperson Linda Rotmark. One key achievement: we awarded a record NINE Continuing Education scholarships because we had so many deserving women.
- We closed the Medical Loan Closet when it was too dangerous for the volunteers, but dedicated committee chairs Becky Archer and Chris Snow and members made sure that emergency needs were met. The MLC was reopened when the county moved into the moderate range.
- We heard from some of our committed fund organizations about the needs we are helping them meet.
- We continued our support of the Dignity for Women Project through the Foodbank, including an entire truckload of feminine products from Linda Rotmark's son Ryan.
- We held an in-person Christmas party led by President-Elect Kim Renfro.
- Members sent gifts to nearly half of all the families in Holiday Joy.
- We located many of our scholarship recipients thanks to Linda Naylor and Pat Willis and found that we helped some amazing people get started on what may be world-changing lives.
- We came up with a new way to hold Tea with SHE over KSQM thanks to Patty Lebowitz and Janet Popelka. Bertha Cooper made two excellent presentations.
- We held our second Virtual Garden Show. Sponsorships increased over our previous show to over \$13,000 thanks to a hard-working Sponsorship committee.

#### **Letter from the Editor**

Dear Friends,

It's May. Last month's showers have begun to fulfill their promise of growth and blossoming of flowers—with plants and trees following along. Last weekend I put on my backyard/work shoes and took Blue out for a walk in the north 40. That's what I call the large yard in back—while it isn't 40 acres, it is to the north. Blue likes to do a perimeter check periodically. He also likes to lie in the grass when the sun is out. Sometimes in the middle of our walk around the yard he simply lies down—no special spot—just when the spirit moves him. Oh, to have that spontaneity—that child-like joy. This was one of those days.

Blue decided to lie down when we were at the northern most area of the yard. While he was soaking in the rays, I raised my eyes and gazed at the landscape before me. There were several trees in view. I noticed they weren't the skeletons they once were. They were showing quite a bit of greenery—but mostly at the top. I could only see a bit of the sky through the foliage, much like the sun coming in the window through lace curtains. However, the lower branches were still waiting for leaves to show up. If Blue hadn't stopped where he did, I might not have seen that. I smiled at this knowing. His joy of being in the sun allowed me to experience some joy also. When he had his fill, he got up and we walked back to the house; I changed to my regular shoes.

Speaking of shoes . . . . one day earlier this week I was getting ready to take Blue for our morning walk. I bent down to tie my shoe. Suddenly a few questions came into my head. How does one learn to tie a shoe? I tried to recall when I didn't know how to do it. How old was I when I learned it? Who taught me? What is the average age of a child learning to tie a shoe? I went to the internet to ask that very question. The consensus is, a child learns to tie a shoe at 5 to 6 years old.

I thought about how a child progresses in learning to tie a shoe. I imagine in the beginning the child doesn't do it perfectly; the loop might be a bit loose—it might even come untied. The child might forget or get stuck sometimes and an older sibling or adult steps in to assist. Over time the child become proficient at tying a shoe. There is a joy in the accomplishment of that learning. That joy is experienced by both the child and the parents.

The above situations brought Soroptimist to mind. Learning to tie a shoe reminds me of new leaders learning their roles. Sometimes things are too loose and may even need to be redone. It can take a while to become proficient, but assistance is always available. The end result is joy for everyone.

The trees with the greenery at the top remind me of our board. Those members are at the top of our club—guiding us throughout the year. They are cohesive and provide a solid front for us. The lower branches are like committees. The committee heads and committee members are formed after the board has been selected. Periodically we take a look at where we are—we do a perimeter check. We stop and think about the things that brought us joy. We think about how our showering of scholarships has empowered women and girls to grow and blossom to their full potential.

Whatever shoes we are wearing, we step forward together and continue our walk through A Brand New Normal.

- We held our second Online Garden Show Auction and nearly doubled the number of items. Organization by Paulette Hill, Jane Manzer, and Linda Naylor with technical support by Kathy Purcell and Kim Renfro.
- Our Facebook site has been consistently active with scholarship stories, notices and reminders of our events. Scholarship graphics by Pauline Geraci.
- We have an exhibit at The Sequim Museum and Art to honor our 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, thanks to creative work by Elaine Bradford.
- We have a 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary website with our history, scholarship winners, Year in Review videos, and statistics on our community impact thanks to the work of Kathy Purcell.
- As a club, we voted to send \$10,000 to Ukraine. Our efforts to share this avenue for donations resulted in over \$40,000 from members, friends, family and the community being sent to Soroptimist International Poland. SI/Poland is using the funds to assist Ukrainian refugees. Our donations apparently inspired other organizations to collect their own donations.
- Our reputation for community service was so stellar that we received a bequest of \$120,000 from Judy Gates, funds for two \$1000 Continuing Education scholarships from an anonymous donor, and two \$1000 donations from women judging the LYDA awards to be given to those we did not choose.

Natasha Merkuloff Nichols transferred to our club in 2021. She has 35 years in Soroptimist. Natasha said she joined Soroptimist because she was an elected City Clerk and was having issues with the (male) City Administrator. "The Soroptimists supported me. Once the issue was resolved, they invited me to join. After learning about their programs, I was happy to join the group of women who had supported me during a hard time at work. I have been a member of two other SI clubs. I was President three times. I've been Vice President, Director, Secretary and Parliamentarian several times.

I've learned that the team matters; the group working together can accomplish amazing things.

"I have also chaired fundraisers, Women Helping Women Award programs, Girls on the Run events, Publicity, Finance, New Member committees and many others. My favorite SI program is Live your Dream. Listening to those stories at regional and SIA meetings is awe inspiring! I love listening to women who have overcome obstacles in their lives. Working hands-on to help women, whether in fundraisers or projects is very fulfilling."

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Kathy Purcell joined in 1998. During her 24 years as a member, she has served in all positions on the board except Assistant Treasurer. She received the Women of Distinction and President's Awards. She is the editor of our unparalleled newsletter "Soropti-Scoop." Her interest in writing started in her freshman year of high school and has been a big part of her life.

Kathy said, "I moved to Sequim in the spring of 1991. I contacted Soroptimist in the early part of 1992 because I wanted to get connected to the community and be part of something worthwhile. I was told I hadn't been in business long enough. (This restriction has since been lifted.) Five and a half years later, in 1997, Louella Hanson brought me to the club.

"I attended the first WIN (Women in Networks) kick-off in November 1997, and I haven't looked back. What attracted me the most was the focus on educating girls. I've been on the Gala Garden Show Core Committee since the beginning and have seen it change over the years. I have been president of SIS three times. The first meeting I attended outside of our club was actually after I was president the first time. Since then, I have held district and region level committee positions. This has given me an opportunity to work with members across the region.

"What I discovered is, it isn't just our club members who are mission-focused, compassionate and supportive of one another. These characteristics are universal throughout the organization. It's the trust we have in one another that allows us to put in our time and talents to organize and run our activities, events, fundraisers, etc. We don't always get to see the fruits of our labor, but we know what we do touches and changes many lives—especially through our scholarships and awards. Education is a gift that keeps on giving. And Soroptimists are giving."

#### TEA WITH S.H.E.—Soroptimst Helping and Empowering

Tea with SHE took to the radio airwaves in April after a two-year pandemic hiatus with not one, but two dynamic programs for older adults. Kudos to Bertha Cooper, BSN, and Cat Xander for these outstanding interviews hosted by Olive Martini, announcer, on KSOM 91.5 FM.

On April 6 the program was titled, "I Can't Wait to Be Old... no one said." Bertha focused on issues impacting women as we age. She talked about seeing aging as a life transition and understanding what is reasonable to expect and what we have the capacity to change. 



## IMPROVING LIVES THROUGH OUR COMMITTED FUNDS CASA—Court Appointed Special Advocates

One of the nonprofit programs that SI of Sequim has provided an ongoing, yearly donation, is the Clallam County CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) program. Friends of CASA fits within the SIS mission in improving the lives of women and girls and aiding in preparing them for an independent and productive life.

This CASA program is an all-volunteer program which advocates for the best interest of minor aged children who find themselves in the foster care system and have needs beyond what is available through foster care funding.

The funds contributed by SIS often go for basic necessities and extra-curricular events, fees for school photos, shoes and clothing needs, a special dress for that special occasion, or fees associated with activities outside of school that enhance a child's self-esteem or furthers their education.

Olympic View Community Foundation serves as the non-profit Fiscal Sponsor for this caring local group of volunteers who provide for the needs of some of our county's most vulnerable children.

Dear Soroptimist International of Sequim,

Congratulations on your 75th anniversary! I hope all your current and past members feel proud of the good you've done in Sequim, now for 75 incredible years. I'm lucky enough to have been a scholarship recipient of Soroptimist International of Sequim, and I know that it has supported me beyond the dollar amount.

I like to think of acts of kindness and generosity in a ripple effect. I believe if you do something nice for someone, they carry that kindness with them and unconsciously pass it on to others. This kindness may fizzle out, but it could go on for so long that it would be impossible to know exactly how much impact your one small act made. I think of my scholarship from Soroptimist in this way, too.



With the help of Soroptimist International of Sequim and other sources of financial aid, I attended a very expensive school, one that was far beyond my family's financial reach.

My diverse education molded me into someone who wanted to explore multiple interests and challenge myself. My newly formed mindset is what pushed me to volunteer for numerous Democratic National Conventions and learn about politics first-hand. It allowed me to volunteer in Ireland on a farm. It was what pushed me to run for a public office when I was just 26 and subsequently became the youngest serving Conservation Supervisor in Washington State.

That education is what pushed me to leave everything I knew and change jobs to try teaching in international schools in Hungary, rural Spain, and Romania and it was what pushed me to apply for a Fulbright Scholarship to continue teaching abroad in Eastern European countries and support children in learning a universal language, one that could open doors for them and promote international communication. That education helped me to land a job in a multinational corporation in Budapest, Hungary, where I currently reside. The biggest honor my team achieved this past year is a campaign called Család az Család, which in Hungarian means "a family is a family" to promote support for families of all types.

But when I think about my own personal achievements, I don't think about them in terms of projects, awards, or accomplishments. I think about them in words. Bravery—I can't believe how many times I left my comfort zone, left my little town to go to school in another state, moved abroad, sang in front of people, and ran for office. Heart—to give so much of myself to others without it ever feeling like a sacrifice, but rather a learning moment. From working hard with environmental nonprofits to spending extra hours helping kids. Gratitude—to always know what others have given me, appreciate it, and always try to pass the kindness on to others.

That ripple effect started long ago with a group of incredible women who took a chance on me in my small town. One scholarship presented opportunities beyond my imagination and made waves that eventually took me to a new continent and enabled me to pass on that generosity to others. I know what Soroptimist International of Sequim did for me, but I don't know the extent of what they did for every person I've come across in my life. Your ripple effect is huge.

Thank you, Soroptimist International of Sequim, and thank you for putting your confidence in me. I'm excited to see future ripples.
