Message from the President

I originally had another article about things that were historical in the month of March, which I was told was way too long for the newsletter. But I was kindly reminded by our editor that March is National Women's History Month. Well what do you know, I now have something to write about and celebrate. So let's celebrate women who have been important in making history and to all those women out there who are making history now.

Here are a few women who have made history and changes:

Ruth Bader Ginsburg (1933-2020)—In 1993 was nominated to the Supreme Court. Ginsburg promoted: financial equality for women, equality in education, LGBTQ rights, civil right for immigrants and undocumented people and rights for people with disabilities.

Harriet Tubman (1822-1913)—She freed around 300 enslaved people via the Underground Railroad. When the Civil War began, she supported the Union, working as spy and a nurse before leading the daring Combahee Ferry Raid, which freed more than 700 enslaved people. Later in life, she became a prominent voice in the abolitionist movement and also fought for voting rights for women, helping to shape a path from slavery and discrimination toward justice in the United States.

Rosa Parks (1913-2005)—During the 1950s, U.S. society was largely segregated between black and white citizens, including on public transport. On December 1, 1955, seamstress Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat to a white passenger on a bus in Montgomery, Alabama, for which she was arrested. In response, Parks mobilized the NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) to boycott buses and draw national attention to inhumane segregation laws in the Southern states.

Our club is about giving women and girls an ability to become something better. We strive to give women and girls empowerment through education—with education comes knowledge and change. What we do for women today will have a ripple effect in the future for generations to come.

So be proud that you are a Soroptimist, be proud that you are making a change for the future. Who knows, maybe a girl or woman we help now will make history because of what we did. Be Proud!

While we have most equipment needed for these surgeries—shower seats, commodes, transport chairs, etc.—we do not stock an ice machine that was requested by one client. Serendipity intervened. Four days later, a gentleman called and wanted to donate an ice machine that his wife used during her hip surgery. We were able to connect the donor and donee and both parties were happy.

We continued to have a busy month at the Closet even though the weather did not cooperate. We received 139 calls during the month of February; lent 72 items and had 62 items returned. We also received donations of \$310.

Kaelyn Davila is a nursing student who received our Continuing Education Scholarship for \$2000 last year.


"Somehow, I made the President's list again! It's hard to believe graduation is just around the corner!

- Best work is rooted in community; and
- You can't have community if you don't have relationships.

Following this presentation, a representative from each club in attendance gave a brief talk about what their club has done and is doing. While this might sound boring, it is an opportunity to learn and gather ideas for fundraising and growing your club, as well as celebrating the successes of others!

I came away from the meeting with renewed enthusiasm for the shared mission of Soroptimist and all of the good things we do.
