IT'S A BIG DEAL

You know when someone wants to emphasize a project, a sale, or a major endeavor they often use the line "It's a Big Deal." Well, this month we have a Big Deal, and it is our program for **January 23, 2024**.

Our club has invited Mark Nichols, Clallam County Prosecutor, to come and educate us about human trafficking in Clallam County and throughout the State of Washington. He will not only be talking to the members of our club. We have sent out invitations to the Lions Club, Rotary Clubs, members of the Sequim Chamber of Commerce and our two sister clubs in Port Angeles to hear him speak.

The polarisproject.org identifies the fact that human trafficking can happen to anyone, but some people are more vulnerable than others. Significant risk factors include recent migration or relocation, substance use, mental health concerns, involvement with the child welfare system and being a runaway or homeless youth. Often, traffickers identify and leverage their victims' vulnerabilities in order to create dependency. I encourage all our members to come and attend our January 23rd program meeting at 8 a.m. Bring a neighbor or friend and learn what you can do to prevent human trafficking.

December was a very good month for both the Medical Loan Closet and the Sequim community. Kudos to Chris Snow who orchestrated a request for a \$2,500 grant from the Sequim Dungeness Hospital Guild and to Jane Manzer who initiated the proposal for a grant. If we receive a grant from the Guild, we plan to purchase up to 12 wheel-chairs of various sizes to replace wheelchairs that are well past their service life. The wheelchairs that we "retire" will be given to the Sequim CERT organization for use by their search and rescue teams to transport injured people to medical support. A win-win for everyone.



The Closet will start the new year with clean and well-organized storage facilities. In mid-December, Frank Finney, from VHOCC, picked up excess equipment from the Closet to be shipped overseas via the Gateway Medical Alliance organization.

Becky and Chris will attend the Pathways meeting in January to inform new members about the Closet and let them know how they may be involved.


We continued to have a very busy month. We received **136** calls during the month of December. We lent **76** items and had **68** items returned. We received **\$505** in donations from our generous community.
