There will be changes as we forge a new path forward, but let's embrace this opportunity respecting SIS's past—as we move forward to meet the new demands through thoughtful strategic efforts that will enhance the lives of women and girls.

Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

HIGH SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT RETURNS TO GIVE BACK

Kaidence Cary received a high school scholarship from us back in 2020-21. She was a McKinney-Vento student who had succeeded in graduating with a high GPA despite many hardships. At that time she planned to become a veterinarian. Unfortunately she owned two large dogs and was unable to find housing that would enable her to attend Yakima Valley College.

She requested to postpone her scholarship for a year and the Awards & Scholarships committee decided that she could. Unfortunately, that pushed her award into a different fiscal year and that caused some budget problems. However, it was eventually solved and she used the funds to enroll at Peninsula College.

The great news is that she is now employed by the Olympia Education Services Unit of Washington State as a Youth Services Resource Navigator! She is stationed at Sequim High School to meet regularly with the McKinney-Vento students and to help them fulfill their needs. She says it's tough to build trust but she understands the process from her own experience.

When asked how Soroptimist could help, Kaidence said that there are several needs that might be easy for us to meet. One is **adult size backpacks** with three compartments. Take them to the School District Office and tell them they are for the McKinney Vento Clothing Closet. They had plenty for younger kids but not enough larger ones appropriate for high school students. They could use clothing—like **sweatpants and shirts and leggings in neutral colors**. The Lions Club is maintaining a clothing closet and it would be great to have more high school type choices there. Kaidence also said **gift cards to Lucky Star** would be much appreciated because kids could pick out their own affordable but trendy clothing there.
