Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

It's January. The calendar tells us it is a new year. The season that focuses on giving and forgiving is drawing to a close. The hustle and bustle of the holidays is all but a distant memory. The decorations have been taken down and put away in their special place until next year.

Just days before the year ended, we received the sad news that Betty Osborn, one of our past Soroptimist Life members, passed away. Her husband, daughter (Debbie Cottrell, who is a current member of our club), and son were with her at the time.

I came to know Betty initially through our WIN (Women in Networks) Program which began in late 1997. When I think of Betty, I think of someone with grace, compassion, and wisdom. Her smile would light up a room as well as the hearts of those in the room. I found her to be quiet and unassuming, but definite in her resolve. In the last few years that she was a member of our club, Betty talked about not renewing her membership because she felt she had nothing to offer. As we age, our physical abilities tend to be reduced. I told her that what she brings to the table is ideas and wisdom—which are important—and not everyone has those talents.

I remember many Installations of new club officers and board members that Betty attended, accompanied by her husband Ross. What great energy the two of them brought and radiated out to everyone there! And Ross is a good hugger. Ross supported our club in many ways over the years and was one of the first Soropti-misters.

The last time I saw Betty was when Debbie came to pick up a Secret Pal gift at my office and Betty was in the front passenger seat. I went out to chat with her. That same bright lovely smile was shining. I reached my hand into the car, and she met it with her hand. I could feel the energy and the love.

During the past year many of our members have had a loved one pass away. I have experienced this myself with the passing of both my brothers-in-law and within six months of each other. At the Celebration of Life for one of them, my niece made a comment that struck me deeply. She said that if we want to keep the memory of her dad alive, live like he lived.

The physical passing of a loved one changes things—on the physical plane. But there is another aspect of our loved one that doesn't change—the love. We feel it through time and space. Tears might fall, but that is just a physical manifestation of the depth of our love. GETTING WITH THE PROGRAM

For our **January 28**th program meeting we will be hearing from **Sarah Brooks**, College and Career Counselor at Sequim High School. Her presentation is on the barriers and influences to students seeking out pathways after graduation. She will also talk specifically about female mentorship ideas.

Also joining us will be Sequim School District Superintendent, **Regan Nickels**, who will outline two key funding proposals for February 2025's special election: Proposition 1, the renewal of the Educational Programs and Operations (EP&O) Levy and Proposition 2, a new School Construction Bond Resolution. The EP&O Levy funds critical programs not fully covered by state funding, while the bond aims to address outdated infrastructure with projects like replacing Helen Haller Elementary and Sequim High School Buildings A,B,C,D and E, upgrading safety and security, improving traffic and parking flow, Greywolf Elementary HVAC improvements and cafeteria, and upgrading multi-sport athletic field facilities. These measures are presented as investments in educational quality, student safety, and community development.

She would come to our home for our meetings, and everything was always perfectly organized and professionally presented.

She also had an amazing memory. A couple of months ago she told me she had a history book about Quincy, WA that she wanted me to take to Fred. She remembered his grandparents and parents had lived there in the 40's, a tidbit he must have shared with her nearly 30 years ago. When I visited her just after she was brought home from the hospital on December 19th, she reminded me that the book for Fred was in the TV room!

Aside from being surprised at that, I was grateful to be able to hold her hand, tell her I admired and appreciated her over the years, and also tell her how much she helped our youngest son learn the value of saving money. Being able to visit her that one last time and tell her what she meant to me emphasized the importance of taking the opportunity to share with others what they mean to us.

MEDICAL LOAN CLOSET SOLIDIFIES CONNECTION WITH CLALLAM FIRE DISTRICT 3

As previously reported, we have been in communication with Clallam County Fire District 3 about partnering with them to support the community if there is an unexpected emergency. Solidifying this relationship now allows us both to be better prepared to assist those in need.

Clallam County Fire District 3 (CCFD3) provided a copy of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between SIS and CCFD3 for signature. The MOU describes the relationship between SIS and CCFD3 relative to CCFD3 access to the MLC equipment in the event of a disaster. Chris Snow and Susan Coffee signed the MOU and the keys to Unit 31 of the MLC were provided to the CCFD3 CERT Representative. A tour of the MLC will be provided to CCFD3 points of contact soon.

As a result of the Tea with SHE event, we established a relationship with Mark Kajalainen, the CCFD3 Community Paramedic. We received two calls from Mark with a request for MLC equipment in December. We plan to ask Mark to speak at our next committee meeting so all our volunteers will have a

chance to meet him and hear about the services he provides to the community. We will also discuss how we can best interface with him.



WHAT'S HAPPENING IN OUR REGION


