Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

It's June—the month that brings us the Summer Solstice—the first day of Summer. June is also the month that ends the Soroptimist year. The 2024-2025 board will be putting down their pens and closing their notebooks. The 2025-2026 board will be picking up their pens and opening their notebooks. There is change happening.

Speaking of change . . . this year we gave out a chuck of change—or rather dollars—to local organizations whose mission aligns with ours. It was part of our spend down plan. Every one of the organizations was very grateful, as funding is particularly needed right now. If you've read the financial reports and/or the Soropti-Scoops you will know where our donations went, and how much they are appreciated. We have received many hand-written notes of gratitude.

Speaking of the Soropti-Scoop, I want to thank all those who wrote articles and provided photos for the newsletter. This is a club publication, and your contributions are a gift to all the members.

When I joined our club, I asked about a newsletter. I was told there hadn't been one for a while. I found a couple copies of old editions. The name of the newsletter was already established. I updated the masthead and developed a layout. Back then I wrote every article; I would call the committee chair or activity coordinator and ask questions. This helped me learn a lot very quickly. In the beginning the frequency of publication was quarterly; then it went to every other month. Soon it became monthly; I found it easier to remember what to report when it was done every month. Plus, it kept things front and center in the minds of the members. I would report on things the club did as well as include upcoming activities.

I did that for seven years. Then it was suggested that the committee chairs or activity coordinators write the articles. That way the report came from a person who best knew what was happening. I liked this for a couple of reasons; yes, it relieved me a little, but more importantly, we got to hear the voices of many members, not just mine. It gave the writers an opportunity to share what they thought was most significant for our members to know. Not every member is involved with every activity; having the articles in the Soropti-Scoop gave members a broader picture of what our club does and how we work together to accomplish our goals.

Another advantage to committees writing their own articles was—some of our members discovered they were good writers; others became better writers. A good publication involves more than just words though.

Articles need some graphics to augment the text. A camera usually accompanied me to meetings and activities. I became the de facto club photographer. In the beginning my photos weren't very good, many were taken from too far away. Over time I got very close. By then everyone was used to seeing me with my camera and I was just part of the background. Why do I bring this up? Because my having a camera and taking photos encouraged a few other members to do the same. Also, members would see things they might not have previously noticed and they'd shoot a photo for the newsletter. It became a team effort. We learned together.

We all have different things we bring to the team. Recognizing those and sharing them enhances our strength and our impact. This past year we made quite an impact while we were Sowing Seeds for the Future. As we move through the changes in the future we know we are a united team. I am grateful to be a part of it.

HIGH SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS

The Sequim High School Scholarship Awards were presented on May 28, 2025. SIS awarded 17 girls a total of \$25,000. That included the first ever Colleen Blazier Medical Scholarship for \$2000 to Victoria Nava, who will study to become a Pediatric Audiologist. Isabel Turrey received the Ruth Mogan Scholarship for Business, and Alexandra Rush received a \$1000 Scholarship presented by her family in honor of former member Betty Osborn.




The funds for the scholarship awards came from our SIS Budget, our Spend Down, and directed donations from individuals.

CONTINUING EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS

The Continuing Education Scholarship applications are now available. This award is focused on Sequim residents and graduates and appears to be unique to SIS. One note: we've had to turn down applicants from other states and they report that no other Soroptimist club they can find focuses specifically on women continuing their education.

Recognizing that the availability of and road to scholarships after high school is less clear, the club targets Continuing Education awards to women who have completed at least a year of post-secondary education (24 semester or 30 quarter units). We continue to look for those who are facing obstacles, who have need, and who are making progress towards a clear goal.

These scholarships can go to women of any age, as long as they have completed the above credit requirements. They can be for advanced certification, retraining, undergraduate study or higher degrees. If you know a student, the parent of a student, or a friend going back to school, please share the information about our Continuing Education Scholarship. Applications are on our website and the due date is August 15, 2025. We were all encouraged by the enthusiastic greetings from the people watching the parade! Kudos to Cheryl for organizing this great way to say 'hello' to our community!



We received a lovely thank you card from one of our MLC clients which read: "Thank you for being there at the medical lending closet to help with my equipment needs. Hip replacement surgery went well and the items helped in the recovery process. It is nice that this service is available for short time needs." All our clients express verbal thanks, but it is especially sweet when they put their words in writing!

We had another historically busy month. In May we answered **203** calls (an average of **50** calls a week), lent **144** items, and had **158** items returned. We received **\$795** in donations from our generous community.
