If you have daughters, encourage them to begin by the time they reach forty or earlier if they have suspicious lumps. Check your health coverage and make sure it covers BRCA1 testing and if not, start advocating for change...Be the Change!

At our program meeting on October 22, 2024, we are fortunate to have Lynn Elmenhurst, RN, BSN. She is a Comprehensive Breast Program RN Coordinator, Radiation Oncology Lead RN and will bring us up to date information on breast cancer diagnosis and treatment. While I will not be with you in person, I will be there in spirit because it is that spirit that supports all of us. Please be sure to attend this meeting in person or via Zoom. There is always new information to be had when it comes to taking care of our girls.

Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

It's October, the month we think of Halloween—a time of scary things—like ghosts and goblins, witches and bats and cauldrons. I have noticed a few bats flying around our property. They are not scary. We live in a rural area and have multiple cameras around that record activity. It's interesting to watch the bats in flight. Sometimes it looks like they are doing a delicate dance in midair. Other times it looks like they are playing an instrument with zest as they quickly zoom through the air—sometimes making quick changes in direction as they do. How do they determine their flight plan? Who writes the music they play?

Before going batty over so many wonderments, I went online. I found some interesting facts about bats. Did you know that the last week in October is Bat Week? There's even a website for it: www.batweekorg states: "Bat Week is an international, annual celebration designed to raise awareness about the need for bat conservation. Bats are amazing creatures that are vital to the health of our natural world and economy. Although we may not always see them, bats are hard at work all around the world each night—eating tons of insects, pollinating flowers, and spreading seeds that grow new plants and trees."

I learned some things about bats from the US Department of Interior website. There are over 1,400 species of bats worldwide. Wow! Not all bats hibernate. Each night, bats can eat their body weight in insects, numbering in the thousands! Wow! This insect-heavy diet helps foresters and farmers protect their crops from pests. Bats are the only flying mammal. While the flying squirrel can only glide for short distances, bats are true fliers. How fast a bat flies depends on the species, but they can reach speeds over 100 miles per hour according to new research. Wow!

Baby bats are called pups, and a group of bats is a colony. About 80 medicines come from plants that rely on bats for their survival. While bats are not blind, studying how bats use echolocation (the location of objects by reflected sound, used by animals such as dolphins and bats) has helped scientists develop navigational aids for the blind. Research on bats has also led to advances in vaccines. Like most mammals, bats have navels—yes, bats have belly buttons—because of the mom's umbilical cord.

Soroptimists are a bit like bats—the flying kind, not the kind at the baseball field. Although it cannot always be seen, we are hard at work locally and around the world, pollinating with our mission. We spread the seeds that allow women and girls access to education, empowering them to grow and reach their full potential. Our flight plan is somewhat flexible though our focus remains the same. Sometimes our passion is more prominent, and we reach a crescendo that cannot be mistaken. Our synergy is akin to echolocation. Those who are new to something aren't doing it blindly—our unity of purpose resonates at our core, providing direction. Imagine what we will scare up as we continue Sowing Seeds for the Future.

Applications are starting to come in for our 2024 Live Your Dream Awards. If you know of a woman who is eligible, please ask her to go to our website and use the link to reach the application portal. To be eligible, a woman must



- 1. provide the primary financial support for herself and her dependants in addition to children, dependents can include spouse, partner, siblings or even parents
- 2. have a financial need
- 3. be enrolled or be accepted into a vocational/skills training program, high school equivalency or an undergraduate program
- 4. be motivated to achieve her educational and career goals
- 5. does not have a graduate degree or is not be enrolled in a graduate program
- 6. and agree to write the essays herself, without the use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools

This last one, about not using AI is new and not a surprising requirement given what we've seen with the growth of AI. In any event, if you know of someone who may benefit from the LYDA program, please encourage them to apply, or contact me for more information.

We are excited about a storage unit next to our main storage units that has become available. The closer unit will make it easier for volunteers to move broken or excess equipment from one unit to another. Our call volume was down a bit at the Medical Loan Closet at **158** calls, but the number of items lent and returned was steady at **112** items lent and **128** items returned. We received **\$290** in donations from our generous community.

2025 GALA GARDEN SHOW (GGS) HAS NEWS!

Members of the GGS Core Committee have been busy, and exciting things are happening as a result! We have two \$1,500 Platinum sponsors who are co-sponsoring our featured speaker, Sue Goetz. Personal communication was part of this coming to fruition. The two co-sponsors are Sofie's Florist and Cascade Bark. The annual sponsorship mailing went out local businesses September 27 and we're already received a few replies; you can see an updated list of sponsors on the GGS website here: https://sequimgardenshow.com/2025-sponsors/. Pledge forms were given out at our October core committee meeting, and they will be passed out to the rest of the membership at our upcoming business meeting. Imagine what the sponsorship list page would look like if each member brought in just one sponsor! This is a team effort, and we encourage all members to participate. We are checking into the feasibility of having cloth or canvas bags printed with the Flower Power logo that we would sell. It will not have a date on it, just the logo—making it more universal over the years.

We plan to order three flutter signs: Parking, Vendor, and Exit which are purported to help in directing traffic. It will be interesting to see how effective they are. These were recommended by CERT, who assisted us with parking last year; they plan to do it again for the 2025 show.

The street banner we've been using is showing its age and it's not certain it would hold up through another GGS season. We are planning to have a new one made; it will have basically the same information, but it will have a cleaner look with lettering that is easy to read from a distance. This maximizes the marketing impact it will have.

The Vendor Team's work has just begun! An initial email went out September 1 to all the vendors who participated last year. All but two said they would be returning. The vendor registration letters and forms were sent out October 1 and some vendors have already sent in their documentation to secure their booths. The vendor list has been divided up between three members of the vendor team—each one being responsible for only certain vendors. This will add an even more personal touch to the relationship between SIS and the vendors.

For the entrance, Shawn will ask New Dungeness Nursery if they would like to do a display for the 2025 show.

The Port Angeles Noon club has decided not to take on the café this year. Roxann has talked with Dominique from Rainshadow Café and she's agreed to provide the food. New member Deb Alwine (who has transferred from the PA Noon club) has volunteered to work with Roxann on the structure of the café.

Virginia Kostanich is heading up the Raffle Committee. She is donating a large custom-built birdhouse with attached planter (\$500), we have a garden cart donated by Colleen Blazier and we have a quilt that was donated by Sunbonnet Sue Quilters. Lots of ideas were shared at the meeting and more will be solidified as we go forward.

Roxann has speakers all set; a list of the topics and bios of the speakers are available on the GGS website. New this year: Lacey Lovell, owner of Sofie's Florist, will be giving a demo on Saturday afternoon. This will be at a time when there won't be a speaker.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN OUR REGION

It is October and our Soroptimist District Meeting is always the event to look forward to. This year the D1 Meeting is being held in Lynnwood from Friday, October 18 – Sunday, October 20. Our district will be working on chartering new clubs. There are many areas that do not have support for women and girls as we do in our community. Our District stretches from Alaska through Chehalis and to the east to the Cascade Mountain range. The charity we will support for this year's Meeting is the YWCA. Their shelter needs blankets, sheets, and towels.





There is a new SIA engagement initiative called **UpliftHER**. "Once a quarter, we will focus on an obstacle that women and girls face on their path to formal education and economic empowerment. SIA will share information about the obstacle, along with suggested projects that count towards our Big Goal. For the first quarter (October-December), we will focus on projects that increase education for women or girls who have experienced Intimate Partner Violence.

Intimate partner violence is devastatingly common for women and girls around the globe.

- Nearly 1 in 3 women will experience it during their lifetime according to the World Health Organization.
- Financial abuse occurs in 99% of domestic violence cases where abusers control or sabotage their partner's financial resources.

When women and girls are educated, they have the skills to command decent wages and the resources to escape unsafe relationships sooner. Clubs with the capacity to start a new project may wish to partner with a local shelter to provide professional dress clothing for women who have experienced violence and provide training on interview basics, resume writing, and career advancement.

This ensures that women rebuilding their lives can pursue economic empowerment without facing additional barriers like the lack of professional clothing or interview skills. Be sure to report it as a Big Goal Accelerator Project!"

Soroptimist International's website provides resources and position papers and the organization's stance on various issues that affect the lives of women and girls. concerns. The latest focuses on widows and the support they need around the world. Especially noted are the new widows in Ukraine.

"No group has been affected more by the "sin of omission" than women or girls of all ages when faced with their partner's death, whether elderly and alone, widows of conflict, widows of climate disasters, COVID-19 widows, child widows or young widows with young children to raise as a single parent and sole provider. No woman should lose her children, status, livelihood, or property when her partner dies. Yet millions of widows face persistent loss, abuse, discrimination, disinheritance, and destitution. For many women around the world, the devastating loss of a partner is magnified by a long-term struggle for their basic human rights and dignity."
