My husband and I took a road trip to Banff and Jasper in Canada, and it was truly breathtaking! The weather was perfect, the scenery stunning, and we met people from all corners of the globe.

However, our wonderful vacation took a turn when we arrived at our hotel in Banff, and I realized my driver's license was missing. As it was my only form of ID, panic set in. Despite searching high and low, it was nowhere to be found. My mind immediately jumped to the worst-case scenario: How would we cross the border home?

In the midst of my stress, we reached out to the American Embassy and Border Patrol. To my relief, the Border Patrol supervisor assured me I would be allowed to return to the US. It was a moment of great relief.

Reflecting on this experience, I realized how easily I had been influenced by the constant stream of negative news. I had allowed fear and worry to overshadow the kindness and support that are so often present.

This experience has made me think deeply about how government cuts are affecting our community and what we, as Soroptimist, can do. Linda and I recently attended a breakfast hosted by United Way to support the Peninsula Food Banks. We heard from many non-profits facing significant budget cuts or anticipating them. It's a challenging time, but it's also an opportunity to show the strength and compassion of our community.

I am confident that by working together, we can overcome these challenges with generosity and kindness. We may need to stretch our resources and work a little harder, but I believe that, united, we can continue to empower others through encouragement, support, and unwavering dedication.

Thank you for your commitment and passion. I am excited to see what we can achieve together in the months ahead.

Letter from the Editor

Dear Friends,

It's October. Autumn is moving in and redecorating the landscape. Summer is slipping away into the shadows. It will return nine months after it left and birth new growth and beauty. The early mornings are cooler, and an extra layer of clothing is sometimes in order.

Speaking of layers . . . one day about a week ago Blue and I were on our early morning walk. There seemed to be more leaves on the ground. One of the bridges we cross was covered with them—and I noticed they were in layers. I saw multiple sizes, shapes and colors. The most recent additions were pretty much intact. No walkers or bikers had passed over them yet. Some in the layer below the top were partially bent and crunched, and the layer closest to the pavement was crumbled—looking almost like colorful sawdust. They had obviously experienced footfalls and tires.

That night the wind was blustery. When Blue and I walked down the driveway the next morning, we were greeted by some downed branches. I moved them off to the side. We weren't on the walk very long when we encountered a long branch that almost completely covered the trail. It wasn't thick in diameter, but it was long. I was able to move it to expose about half of the trail—enough space for a walker or biker to get through. When we got to the bridge mentioned above, it was no longer blanketed with leaves; most of the top layer was missing.

When we got near a bend in the trail, there were a lot of downed branches. Their diameters were small, and each had multiple stalks with lots of leaves. Although they covered a good amount of the trail, because of their size, it was easy to walk over them. Well, there was one that was a little larger in diameter and I was able to move it out of the way. We continued our walk and came across a similar section of downed branches. Like the others, they were easy to traverse. I thought about how many other sections of trails were redecorated by the wind and would need clearing; I knew there are volunteers who maintain the trails, and once the sun came up they would be busy.

The wind came to visit again that night, but not to the level of intensity of the previous night. When Blue and I walked down the driveway the next morning, there were no branches to offer me early morning exercise. Likewise, when we got to where I had moved the first branch partially off the trail; it was totally off to the side in the grassy area. A lot of the trail seemed devoid of branches and leaves. It had to be more than just the wind that accomplished this. My thought was reinforced when I got to the bridge that yesterday still had a couple of layers of leaves. All that was left was a two and a half inch wide strip of the 'sawdust' layer running the length of the bridge. Someone had been there with a leaf blower. The rest of the trail was also clear; all of the thin branches were gone.

This all reminded me of our club. Similar to the leaves on the bridge, we are all different. Like the newer leaves, our newer members are front and center. We get to see their beauty, energy and talents. As newer members participate, they start to merge with other members, becoming more involved at a deeper level. As time goes on each member's energy morphs into a combined vibrant club synergy. The winds of life may blow us around a bit, but in the end, we still have our core foundation of values. Before I take leave, I leave you with this, we are the volunteers who maintain the trail of our mission. In the process we will continue Empowering Through Encouragement.

PROFESSIONAL/TECHNICAL SCHOLARSHIP

Soroptimist awards our Professional/Technical scholarships through the Peninsula College Foundation who advertise for us, go to professors for candidates, and screen for the final selection. While privacy concerns mean we know less about the recipients of these awards, the following information shows that our two \$2,000 scholarships are going to the types of women we want to support.

One of our winners is a single parent in the welding program with a goal of joining the Boilermakers Union and working on large-scale industrial projects. In addition to parenting, she works part-time and goes to school full-time. She is also in substance use recovery and volunteers with nonprofits to support others in their recovery journey.

Our second recipient is a full-time student completing prerequisites for nursing. She volunteers in health-related fields and has worked as a caregiver. She grew up doing service work and knew from early on that she wanted to work in healthcare. She is active with the Volunteer Hospice of Clallam County outside of school.







Giving History and Donor Impact

Prepared for Soroptimist International of Sequim
October 7, 2025

April 2025 (\$20,000)—Student Emergency Aid Program

Unexpected expenses force students to make the difficult choice between paying an unbudgeted bill or paying tuition and remaining enrolled in school. The student emergency aid program makes one-time grants to assist Peninsula College students in paying these expenses. The Soroptimist International of Sequim gift was used to subsidize the existing funds in this program, allowing the financial aid committee to approve more applications and to ensure that more Peninsula College students remain enrolled in school. Because of this support, a total of 22 students received one-time emergency assistance over spring and summer quarters. Please see the breakdown of requests and awards made over this period.

Spring 2025

- 118 individual requests from 88 unduplicated students
- 62.5% of students with female-presenting names
- **Soroptimist International of Sequim** funded 15 *additional* students (\$17,043)
 - Housing (14) - \$16,656.00
 - Utilities (1) - \$387.00

Summer 2025

- 46 individual requests from 40 unduplicated students
- 70% of students with female-presenting names
- **Soroptimist International of Sequim** funded 7 *additional* students (\$2,957)


